IPOS Cancer and Aging: Reflection for Elders (CARE) Special Interest Group (SIG)

Mission of the CARE SIG

In response to the rapid growth of the aging population diagnosed with cancer and their caregivers, the mandate of the Cancer and Aging: Reflection for Elders (CARE) SIG is to promote global collaborations among researchers, clinicians, and decision makers to improve outcomes for these groups.

2021 Activities and Goals for 2022

The CARE SIG had not been active for the past couple of years. Due to increased interest and the recognition of the importance of focusing on the experience of older adults with cancer and their caregivers, we have re-launched this SIG in 2021. We had an initial meeting via Zoom on 9/17/2021. At this meeting, attendees introduced themselves and talked about their experience in working with older adults and their caregivers as well as their clinical and research activities in this area.

We identified initial goals for the CARE SIG in 2022. These included: submitting proposals \to the next IPOS annual meeting as well and considering CARE SIG-sponsored webinars. Possible topics for webinars included bereavement, comorbidities and cancer in older adults, cancer-related misbelief or cancer as a family event. We also discussed interest in developing international guidelines for working with older adult cancer patients and their caregivers. Finally, we discussed the importance of focusing on cultural issues when addressing issues related to older adults and cancer. We plan to have at least two meetings of the CARE SIG in 2022 and will also develop smaller groups to plan SIG-related activities.
